Sex Trafficking and Commercial Sexual Exploitation

What is Sex Trafficking?

 When someone uses force, fraud or coercion to cause a commercial sex act with an adult or causes a minor to commit a commercial sex act


What is a Commercial Sex Act?

 Examples include prostitution, pornography, and sexual performance done in exchange for anything of value, such as money, food, shelter, clothes.

What is Child Sexual Exploitation and Trafficking?

- When a person under the age of 18 is sexually abused or violated in exchange for anything of value, such as money, power or status
- Child Sex Trafficking occurs when a 3rd party (trafficker/"pimp") profits from the act
- When a minor is the victim, force, fraud, or coercion need not be present

Intersections of Abuse




Choice Defined


choice noun

Definition of *choice* **(Entry 1 of 2)**

- 1 : the act of choosing : <u>SELECTION</u>// finding it hard to make a *choice*
- 2 : power of choosing : OPTION

Adolescent Brains: What IS going on in there?




Adolescent Brains: Let's Break it Down

- Young people are making decisions from their **AMYGDALA**, the emotional part of the brain.
- Pre-Frontal Cortex (PFC), which is the decision making center of the brain, is not fully developed until age 25
- High stress environments trigger a cortisol response—that means the amygdala is constantly activated
- Young people are not thinking as much as they are feeling

Food for thought:

If a person experiences trauma at a young age, how does this impact their behavior when they are a 27 year old adult, accounting for brain development?


A lot of people always think that somebody's making them do it or forcing them to do it. That's not the case. Most cases, these girls are already doing it. They're doing it on their own. It's just, they hate to be by themselves, or they can't take care of their money.

It's just like any regular household. A man takes care of the household, so they feel like that's what they need the man there for. You feel like family. When you're looking out for somebody like that, it don't feel like a business. It feels like family. I got your back, you got mine.



"If it's a new girl trying to get on my team, I have sex with them first because I know I can get in they head. Once I make love to them, or what they think is love, know what I'm saying, I really don't have no feelings behind it. I just be thinking about money... I didn't beat my girls. I might fight them sometimes, like slap them or something, but I didn't beat them where I just beat them for no reason or something. It wasn't like that. We'd just fight. It wasn't all harsh. I didn't do them bad or nothing like that. I spoiled them like they spoiled me.—Jasmine Johnson, Pimp from Dallas

ACES: Adverse Childhood Experiences

- 1. Physical abuse
- 2. Sexual abuse
- 3. Emotional abuse
- 4. Physical neglect
- 5. Emotional neglect
- 6. Mother treated violently (witness/victim of domestic violence)
- 7. Household substance abuse (addiction)
- 8. Household mental illness
- 9. Parental separation or divorce
- 10. Incarcerated household member

The ACE (Adverse Childhood Experience) Study

Conducted by the US Center for Disease Control & Kaiser Permanente

17,000 PARTICIPANTS SURVEYED

Female Participants:

13% emotional abuse 27% physical abuse 24.7% sexual abuse

Male Participants:

7.6% emotional abuse 29.9% physical abuse 16% sexual abuse

The ACE Study Findings

suggest that certain experiences are major risk factors for the leading causes of illness and death as well as poor quality of life in the United States.

It is critical to understand how some of the worst health and social problems in our nation can arise as a consequence of adverse childhood experiences.

Realizing these connections is likely to improve efforts towards prevention and recovery.

Key Takeaways

- Remember that a young person's chronological age is not an indicator for rational decision making
- Consider the impact of trauma on the brain + its impact on a young person
- Co-occurring risk factors are often present that make a youth vulnerable to sex traffickers and the commercial sex industry
- "Choice" is tied up in age and perceived cognitive development—think of informed consent
